# SINGULAR INTEGRAL OPERATORS ON MANIFOLDS WITH A BOUNDARY 

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#### Abstract

This paper deals with singular integral operators that are bounded, completely continuous, and Noetherian on manifolds with a boundary in weighted Hölder spaces.


We shall investigate the matrix singular operator

A(u)(x)=a(x) u(x)+\int_{D} f\left(x, \frac{x-y}{|x-y|}\right)|x-y|^{-m} u(y) d y \\
x \in D, \quad D \subset \mathbb{R}^{m}
\end{gathered}

in weighted Hölder spaces and develop the results obtained in [1] for onedimensional singular operators and in [2-8] for multidimensional singular operators in Lebesgue spaces.

This paper consists of two sections. In Section I we shall prove the theorems of integral operators that are bounded and completely continuous in Hölder spaces with weight. Section II will contain the proof of the theorem of factorization of matrix-functions and present the theorem of singular operators that are Noetherian in weighted spaces.

1. Let $\mathbb{R}^{m}(m \geq 2)$ be an $m$-dimensional Euclidean space, $x=\left(x_{1}, \ldots, x_{m}\right)$, $y=\left(y_{1}, \ldots, y_{m}\right)$ be points of the space $\mathbb{R}^{m}$,

Definition 1. A function $u$ defined on $\mathbb{R}^{m} \backslash \Gamma$ belongs to the space $H_{\alpha, \beta}^{\nu}\left(\mathbb{R}^{m} \backslash \Gamma\right)(0<\nu, \alpha<1, \beta \geq 0, \alpha+\beta<m)$ if
(i) $\forall x \in \mathbb{R}^{m} \backslash \Gamma \quad|u(x)| \leq c\left|x_{m}\right|^{-\alpha}(1+|x|)^{-\beta}$,

The norm in the space $H_{\alpha, \beta}^{\nu}\left(\mathbb{R}^{m} \backslash \Gamma\right)$ is defined by the equality

y \in B\left(x, \frac{1}{2}\left|x_{m}\right|\right)}}\left|x_{m}\right|^{\alpha+\nu}(1+|x|)^{\beta} \frac{|u(x)-u(y)|}{|x-y|^{\nu}} .

The space $H_{\alpha, \beta}^{\nu}\left(\mathbb{R}_{+}^{m}\right)$ is defined similarly.
Note that if $y \in B\left(x, \frac{1}{2}\left|x_{m}\right|\right)$, then

Thus for $y \in B\left(x, \frac{1}{2} x_{m}\right)$ we have $|x| \sim|y|,\left|x_{m}\right| \sim\left|y_{m}\right|$.
Let $x, y \in \mathbb{R}^{m} \backslash \Gamma$ and $|x-y| \geq \frac{1}{2} \min \left(\left|x_{m}\right|,\left|y_{m}\right|\right)$. Then the condition (i) implies

and therefore the condition (ii) can be replaced by the condition

One can easily prove that the space $H_{\alpha, \beta}^{\nu}\left(\mathbb{R}^{m} \backslash \Gamma\right)\left[H_{\alpha, \beta}^{\nu}\left(\mathbb{R}_{+}^{m}\right)\right]$ is the Banach one.

Consider the singular integral operator

v(x)=A(u)(x)=\int_{\mathbb{R}^{m}} K(x, x-y) u(y) d y
$$

where $K(x, z)=f\left(x, \frac{z}{|z|}\right)|z|^{-m}$.
Theorem 1. Let the characteristic $f$ defined on $\left(\mathbb{R}^{m} \backslash \Gamma\right) \times(S(0,1) \backslash \Gamma)$ satisfy the conditions
(a) $\forall x \in \mathbb{R}^{m} \backslash \Gamma \int_{S(0,1)} f(x, z) d_{z} S=0 ;$
(b) $\forall x \in \mathbb{R}^{m} \backslash \Gamma, \forall z \in S(0,1) \backslash \Gamma \quad|f(x, z)| \leq c\left|z_{m}\right|^{-\sigma} \quad(0 \leq \sigma \leq \alpha)$;
(c) $\forall x, y \in \mathbb{R}^{m} \backslash \Gamma, \forall z, \theta, \omega \in S(0,1) \backslash \Gamma$

Then the operator $A$ is bounded in the space $H_{\alpha, \beta}\left(\mathbb{R}^{m} \backslash \Gamma\right)$.
Proof. In the first place note that the second inequality of the condition (c) yields the inequality

D_{3}=B\left(0, \frac{1}{2}(1+|x|)\right) \backslash\left(D_{1} \cup D_{2}\right), \quad D_{4}=\mathbb{R}^{m} \backslash\left(D_{1} \cup D_{2} \cup D_{3}\right),  \tag{3}\\
D=\left\{y:\left(y^{\prime}, y_{m}\right) \in \mathbb{R}^{m}, \quad\left|y_{m}\right| \leq 2\left(\left|y^{\prime}\right|+1\right)\right\}
\end{gather*}

We have

By virtue of the condition (ii) and the inequalities (1)

\left|I_{1}(x)\right| \leq c\left|x_{m}\right|^{-(\alpha+\nu)}(1+|x|)^{-\beta} \int_{D_{1}}\left|f\left(\frac{x-y}{|x-y|}\right)\right||x-y|^{\nu-m} d y\|u\| \leq \\
\leq c\left|x_{m}\right|^{-\alpha}(1+|x|)^{-\beta} \int_{S(0,1)}|f(z)| d_{z} S\|u\| \tag{4}
\end{gather*}

If $y \notin D_{1}$, then $|x-y| \geq \frac{1}{6}\left(\left|x^{\prime}-y^{\prime}\right|+\left|x_{m}\right|+\left|y_{m}\right|\right)$ and if $y \in D_{2}$, then $1+|y| \geq 1+|x|-|x-y| \geq \frac{1+|x|}{2}$. Therefore due to the conditions (i) and (b)

\left|I_{2}(x)\right| \leq c(1+|x|)^{-\beta} \int_{D_{2}} \frac{\left|y_{m}\right|^{-\alpha}\left|y_{m}-x_{m}\right|^{-\sigma}}{\left(\left|x^{\prime}-y^{\prime}\right|+\left|x_{m}\right|+\left|y_{m}\right|\right)^{m-\sigma}} d y\|u\|
$$

After performing the spherical transformation of $y^{\prime}-x^{\prime}$, we obtain

\left|I_{2}(x)\right| \leq c(1+|x|)^{-\beta} \int_{0}^{\infty} r^{m-2} d r \int_{-\infty}^{\infty} \frac{\left|y_{m}\right|^{-\alpha}\left|x_{m}-y_{m}\right|^{-\sigma}}{\left(r+\left|x_{m}\right|+\left|y_{m}\right|\right)^{m-\sigma}} d y_{m}\|u\|
$$

The transformation of $r=\left|x_{m}\right| \widetilde{r}, y_{m}=\left|x_{m}\right| \widetilde{y}_{m}$ leads to

& \quad \times \int_{0}^{\infty}\left(r+\left|y_{m}\right|+1\right)^{\sigma-2} d r\|u\| \leq c\left|x_{m}\right|^{-\alpha}(1+|x|)^{-\beta} \times \\
& \quad \times \int_{-\infty}^{\infty}\left|y_{m}\right|^{-\alpha}\left|y_{m}-\operatorname{sign} x_{m}\right|^{-\sigma}\left(1+\left|y_{m}\right|\right)^{\sigma-1} d y_{m}\|u\| \tag{5}

The term $I_{4}(x)$ is evaluated in the same manner, since in that case, too, $1+|y| \geq \frac{1}{2}(|x|+1)$. Represent $I_{3}(x)$ in the form

If $y \in D_{3}$, then $|x-y| \geq \frac{1}{2}(1+|x|) \geq|y|$; if $y \notin B\left(0, \frac{1}{2}\left|x_{m}\right|\right)$, then $|y| \geq \frac{\left|x_{m}\right|}{2}$ and hence $|y| \geq \frac{1}{4}\left(\left|y^{\prime}\right|+\left|x_{m}\right|+\left|y_{m}\right|\right)$. Therefore, in evaluating $J_{2}(x)$, we shall have

After performing the spherical transformation of $y^{\prime}$, we obtain, as in the case of evaluating $I_{2}(x)$,

Write $J_{1}(x)$ in the form

If $y \in B\left(0, \frac{1}{2}\left|x_{m}\right|\right)$, then $\left|x_{m}-y_{m}\right| \geq\left|x_{m}\right|-\left|y_{m}\right| \geq \frac{1}{2}\left|x_{m}\right|$. We have

\left|J_{1}^{\prime}(x)\right| \leq c(1+|x|)^{-m+\sigma}\left|x_{m}\right|^{-\sigma} \int_{\left|y^{\prime}\right| \leq \frac{1}{2}(1+|x|)}\left(1+\left|y^{\prime}\right|\right)^{-\beta} d y^{\prime} \times \\
\times \int_{\left|y_{m}\right| \leq 2\left(\left|y^{\prime}\right|+1\right)}\left|y_{m}\right|^{-\alpha} d y_{m}\|u\| \leq \\
\leq c\left|x_{m}\right|^{-\sigma}(1+|x|)^{\sigma-m} \int_{\left|y^{\prime}\right| \leq \frac{1}{2}(1+|x|)}\left(1+\left|y^{\prime}\right|\right)^{1-\beta-\alpha} d y^{\prime}\|u\| \leq \\
\leq c\left|x_{m}\right|^{-\alpha}(1+|x|)^{-\beta}\left|x_{m}\right|^{\alpha-\sigma}(1+|x|)^{\beta+\sigma-m}\left(c+(1+|x|)^{m-(\beta+\alpha)}\right)\|u\| \leq \\
\leq c\left|x_{m}\right|^{-\alpha}(1+|x|)^{-\beta}\|u\|, \tag{7}
\end{gather*}
$$

since $\sigma \leq \alpha, \alpha+\beta<m$.
If $y \in \mathbb{R}^{m} \backslash D$, then $1+|y|<1+\left|y^{\prime}\right|+\left|y_{m}\right|<\frac{3}{2}\left|y_{m}\right|$. Therefore

& \leq c\left|x_{m}\right|^{-\alpha}(1+|x|)^{-\beta}\|u\| . \tag{8}

From the estimates (4)-(8) we obtain

Let us evaluate the difference $v(x)-v(z)$. It is assumed that $|x-z| \leq$ $\frac{1}{8}\left|x_{m}\right|$. Then $|z| \sim|x|,\left|z_{m}\right| \sim\left|x_{m}\right|$.

We introduce the set $\widetilde{D}_{1}=B(x, 2|x-z|), \widetilde{D}_{2}=B(z, 3|x-z|), \widetilde{D}_{3}=$ $B\left(z, \frac{1}{2}\left|x_{m}\right|-|x-z|\right)$. Clearly, $\widetilde{D}_{1} \subset \widetilde{D}_{2} \subset \widetilde{D}_{3} \subset B\left(x, \frac{1}{2}\left|x_{m}\right|\right)=D_{1}$. We have the representation

By virtue of the first inequality of the condition (c) the term $I_{1}(x, z)$ is evaluated exactly in the same manner as $v(x)$ and we obtain the estimate

Rewrite the term $I_{2}(x, z)$ in the form

-\int_{\widetilde{D}_{3} \backslash \widetilde{D}_{2}} K(z, z-y)[u(y)-u(x)] d y-\int_{\widetilde{D}_{2}} K(z, z-y)[u(y)-u(z)] d y+ \\
+\int_{\mathbb{R}^{m} \backslash D_{1}}[K(z, x-y)-K(z, z-y)] u(y) d y= \\
=\left(\int_{\widetilde{D}_{2}}+\int_{D_{1} \backslash \widetilde{D}_{3}}\right) K(z, x-y)[u(y)-u(x)] d y- \\
\quad-\int_{\widetilde{D}_{3}} K(z, z-y)[u(y)-u(z)] d y- \\

In evaluating $J_{1}(x, z)$, note that $\widetilde{D}_{2} \subset B(x, 4|x-z|), \quad B\left(x, \left.\frac{1}{2}\left|x_{m}\right|-2 \right\rvert\, x-\right.$ $z \mid) \subset \widetilde{D}_{3}$. Therefore by virtue of the condition (b) and the inequalities (1) we obtain

& \quad \leq c\left|x_{m}\right|^{-(\alpha+\nu)}(1+|x|)^{-\beta}|x-z|^{\nu}\|u\| \tag{11}
\end{align*}

since $\left(\frac{1}{2}\left|x_{m}\right|\right)^{\nu}-\left(\frac{1}{2}\left|x_{m}\right|-2|z-z|\right)^{\nu} \leq c|x-z|^{\nu}$. Similarly, if $y \in \widetilde{D}_{2}$, then $|y-z| \leq 3|x-z| \leq \frac{3\left|x_{m}\right|}{8} \leq \frac{3}{7}\left|z_{m}\right|$. Therefore

\left|J_{2}(x, z)\right| \leq c\left|x_{m}\right|^{-(\alpha+\nu)}(1+|x|)^{-\beta}|x-z|^{\nu}\|u\| \tag{12}

It is clear that $B\left(x, \frac{1}{2}\left|x_{m}\right|\right) \subset B\left(z, \frac{1}{2}\left|x_{m}\right|+|x-z|\right)$ and hence

& \leq c\left|x_{m}\right|^{-\alpha}(1+|x|)^{-\beta} \ln \frac{\left|x_{m}\right|+2|x-z|}{\left|x_{m}\right|-2|x-z|}\|u\| \leq
\end{aligned}

& \leq c\left|x_{m}\right|^{-\alpha}(1+|x|)^{-\beta} \frac{|x-z|}{\left|x_{m}\right|-2|x-z|}\|u\| \leq \\
& \leq c\left|x_{m}\right|^{-(\alpha+\nu)}(1+|x|)^{-\beta}|x-z|^{\nu}\|u\| \tag{13}

Note that if $y \notin \widetilde{D}_{2}$, then

Taking these inequalities into account, the inequality (2) readily implies that for $y \notin \widetilde{D}_{2}$

using which we obtain

\times \int_{\widetilde{D}_{3} \backslash \widetilde{D}_{2}} \frac{1}{|x-y|^{m+\nu_{1}-\nu}}\left(\frac{|x-y|^{\nu_{1}+\sigma}}{\left|x_{m}-y_{m}\right|^{\nu_{1}+\sigma}}+\frac{|z-y|^{\nu_{1}+\sigma}}{\left|z_{m}-y_{m}\right|^{\nu_{1}+\sigma}}\right) d y\|u\| \leq \\
\leq c\left|x_{m}\right|^{-(\alpha+\nu)}(1+|x|)^{-\beta}|x-z|^{\nu_{1}} \times \\
\times\left(\int_{D_{1} \backslash \widetilde{D}_{1}} \frac{1}{|x-y|^{m+\nu_{1}-\nu}}\left(\frac{|x-y|}{\left|x_{m}-y_{m}\right|}\right)^{\nu_{1}+\sigma} d y+\right. \\
\left.\quad+\int_{\widetilde{D}_{3} \backslash \widetilde{D}_{2}} \frac{1}{|z-y|^{m+\nu_{1}-\nu}}\left(\frac{|z-y|}{\left|z_{m}-y_{m}\right|}\right) d y\right) .

Passing to the spherical coordinates and keeping in mind that $\frac{x_{m}-y_{m}}{|x-y|}$, $\frac{z_{m}-y_{m}}{|z-y|}$ do not depend on the radius, we have

The set $M$ is called an $(m-1)$ dimensional manifold without a boundary of the class $C^{1, \delta}(0 \leq \delta \leq 1)$, if for each $x \in M$ there exist a positive number $r_{x}$ and a neighborhood $Q(x)$ of the point $x$ in $\mathbb{R}^{m}$, which is mapped by means of the orthogonal transform $T_{x}$ onto the cylinder $\Omega_{0}=\left\{\xi: \xi \in \mathbb{R}^{m},\left|\xi^{\prime}\right|<r_{x},\left|\xi_{m}\right|<r_{x}\right\}$ and if the following conditions are fulfilled: $T_{x}(x)=0$, the set $T_{x}(M \cap Q(x))$ is given by the equation $\xi_{m}=\varphi_{x}\left(\xi^{\prime}\right),\left|\xi^{\prime}\right|<r_{x} ; \varphi_{x} \in C^{1, \delta}$ in the domain $\left|\xi^{\prime}\right|<r_{x}$ and $\partial_{\xi_{i}} \varphi_{x}(0)=0, i=1, \ldots, m-1$.

Clearly, $Q(x)$ is the cylinder to be denoted by $C\left(x, r_{x}\right)$.
In what follows the manifold $M$ will be assumed compact.
We introduce the notation

To evaluate the integral term $I_{4}$ note that for $y \notin \widetilde{D}_{1}$ we have

& \quad+c \frac{|x-z|^{\nu_{1}}}{|x-y|^{m+\nu_{1}}}\left(\frac{|x-y|^{\nu_{1}+\sigma}}{\left|x_{m}-y_{m}\right|^{\nu_{1}+\sigma}}+\frac{|z-y|^{\nu_{1}+\sigma}}{\left|z_{m}-y_{m}\right|^{\nu_{1}+\sigma}}\right)
\end{aligned}
$$

Using this estimate in the same manner as in proving Theorem 1, we obtain

The estimates (28)-(31) show that the operator $B$ is bounded from the space $H_{\alpha, \beta}^{\nu}\left(\mathbb{R}^{m} \backslash \Gamma\right)$ into the space $H_{\alpha-\gamma, \beta+2 \gamma}^{\nu+\gamma}\left(\mathbb{R}^{m} \backslash \Gamma\right)$. The validity of the theorem now follows from the complete continuity of the operator of the embedding of the space $H_{\alpha-\gamma, \beta+2 \gamma}^{\nu+\gamma}\left(\mathbb{R}^{m} \backslash \Gamma\right)$ into the space $H_{\alpha, \beta}^{\nu}\left(\mathbb{R}^{m} \backslash \Gamma\right)$.

In a similar manner we prove
Theorem 4. Let $m \in C^{1, \delta}$, let the characteristic $f$ of the operator $A$ satisfy the conditions of Theorem 2, the first inequality of the condition (b) being replaced by a stronger inequality

and let the function a satisfy the conditions of Theorem 3. Then the operator $B$ is completely continuous in the space $H_{\alpha, \beta}^{\nu}\left(\mathbb{R}^{m} \backslash M\right)$.
2. We shall consider the matrix-function $A(\xi)=\left\|A_{i j}(\xi)\right\|_{n \times n}$. Let

We set $A_{0}=A^{-1}(0, \ldots, 0,-1) A(0, \ldots, 0,+1)$. It is assumed that $\lambda_{j}$ $(j=1, \ldots, s)$ is the eigenvalue of the matrix $A_{0}$ and $r_{j}$ is its multiplicity $\left(\sum_{j=1}^{s} r_{j}=n\right)$.

We introduce the matrices $B_{r}(\alpha) \equiv\left\|B_{\nu k}(\alpha)\right\|_{r \times r}$ where

By the Jordan theorem the matrix $A_{0}$ is representable in the form $A_{0}=$ $g B g^{-1}$, where $\operatorname{det} g \neq 0, B$ is the modified Jordan form of the matrix $A_{0}$, $B=\operatorname{diag}\left[\lambda_{1} B\left(r_{1} ; 1\right), \ldots, \lambda_{s} B\left(r_{s} ; 1\right)\right]$. We introduce the notation

\alpha_{ \pm}(\xi)=\frac{1}{2 \pi i} \ln \frac{\xi_{m} \pm\left|\xi^{\prime}\right|}{\left|\xi^{\prime}\right|}\left(\xi^{\prime}=\left(\xi_{1}, \ldots, \xi_{m-1}\right)\right)
\end{gathered}

by $\ln z$ we denote a logarithm branch which is real on the positive semi-axis, i.e., $-\pi<\arg z \leq \pi$,

\left(\frac{\xi_{m} \pm i\left|\xi^{\prime}\right|}{\left|\xi^{\prime}\right|}\right)^{\delta} \equiv \operatorname{diag}\left[\left(\frac{\xi_{m} \pm i\left|\xi^{\prime}\right|}{\left|\xi^{\prime}\right|}\right)^{\delta_{1}}, \ldots,\left(\frac{\xi_{m} \pm i\left|\xi^{\prime}\right|}{\left|\xi^{\prime}\right|}\right)^{\delta_{n}}\right] \\
B_{ \pm}(\xi)
\end{gathered}

Theorem 5. Let the matrix $A$ be strongly elliptic. Then A admits the factorization $A(\xi)=c g A_{-}\left(\xi^{\prime}, \xi_{m}\right) D(\xi) A_{+}\left(\xi^{\prime}, \xi_{m}\right) g^{-1}$, where

c=A(0, \ldots,+1), \quad D(\xi)=B_{-}(\xi)\left(\xi_{m}-i\left|\xi^{\prime}\right|\right)^{\delta}\left(\xi_{m}+i\left|\xi^{\prime}\right|\right)^{-\delta} B_{+}^{-1}(\xi) \\
A_{ \pm}(\lambda \xi)=A_{ \pm}(\xi) \quad(\lambda>0), \quad \operatorname{det} A_{ \pm}(\xi) \neq 0
\end{gathered}
$$

For $\left|\xi^{\prime}\right| \neq 0$ the matrices $A_{+}, A_{+}^{-1}$ (accordinly, $A_{-}, A_{-}^{-1}$ ) admit analytic continuations with respect to $\xi_{m}$ into the upper (lower) complex half-plane and these continuations are bounded.

Moreover, for any natural number $k$ the matrix $A_{ \pm}$admits the expansion

where $c^{p q} \in C^{\infty}\left(\mathbb{R}^{m-1} \backslash 0\right), \stackrel{k}{A}(\lambda \xi)=\stackrel{k}{A}(\xi)(\lambda>0), \stackrel{k}{A} \in C^{k}\left(\mathbb{R}^{m} \backslash 0\right)$. Similar expansions also hold for the inverse matrices $A_{ \pm}^{-1}$.

Let us outline a scheme for proving the theorem.
We set

Z_{+}=\left\{z=x_{1}+i x_{2}, x_{2}>0\right\}, \quad Z_{-}=\left\{z=x_{1}+i x_{2}, x_{2}<0\right\} .
\end{gathered}

Consider the homogeneous Hilbert problem: Find an analytic (in the domain $Z_{+} \cup Z_{-}$) matrix-function $\Phi\left(\xi^{\prime}, z\right)$, which is left and right continuously extendable on $\mathbb{R}$, by the boundary condition

\Phi^{-}\left(\xi^{\prime}, t\right)=A_{*}\left(\xi^{\prime}, t\right) \Phi^{+}\left(\xi^{\prime}, t\right), \quad \lim _{\bar{Z}_{+} \ni z \rightarrow \infty} \Phi\left(\xi^{\prime}, z\right)=I, \quad \lim _{\bar{Z}_{-} \ni z \rightarrow \infty} \Phi\left(\xi^{\prime}, z\right)=I
$$

The solution is to be sought in the form

\Phi\left(\xi^{\prime}, z\right)=\frac{1}{2 \pi i} \int_{\mathbb{R}} \frac{\varphi\left(\xi^{\prime}, z\right)}{t-z} d t+I
$$

To define the matrix $\varphi$ we obtain the system of singular integral equations

=2\left(I-A_{*}\left(\xi^{\prime}, t_{0}\right)\right) \tag{33}
\end{gather*}

One can prove that the system (33) is unconditionally and uniquely solvable and obtain, after a rather sophisticated reasoning, the desired result.

Remark 1. The fact that partial indices of the strongly elliptic matrix $A$ are equal to zero is proved in [5]. An expansion of the form (32) when $A$ is a scalar function is also obtained therein.

Let $D$ be a finite or infinite domain in $\mathbb{R}^{m}$ bounded by the compact manifold without a boundary $M$ from the class $C^{1, \nu_{1}}$.

Consider the matrix singular operator

in the spaces $\left[H_{\alpha, \beta}^{\nu}(D)\right]^{n}\left(0<\alpha, \nu<1, \nu<\nu_{1}, \beta>0, \alpha+\beta<m\right)$ and $\left[L_{p}\left(D,(1+|x|)^{\gamma}\right)\right]^{n}\left(p>1,-\frac{m}{p}<\gamma<\frac{m}{p^{\prime}}, p^{\prime}=\frac{p}{p-1}\right), u \in L_{p}\left(D,\left(1+|x|^{\gamma}\right) \leftrightarrow\right.$ $\int_{D} \mid u(x)^{p}(1+|x|)^{p \gamma} d x<\infty$.

Taking into account the character of the linear bounded operator acting in the spaces with two norms (see [11]), the proved theorems enable us to prove

Theorem 6. Let $a \in H_{\lambda}^{\nu_{1}}(\bar{D}), f(x, \cdot) \in C^{\infty}\left(\mathbb{R}^{m} \backslash 0\right), \int_{S(0,1)} f(x, z) d_{z} S=0$; $\partial_{z}^{p} f(\cdot, z) \in H_{\lambda}^{\nu_{1}}(\bar{D}),|p|=0,1, \ldots$, if the domain $D$ is bounded; $\lim _{x \rightarrow \infty} f(x, z) \equiv$ $f(\infty, z)$ and $\partial_{z}^{p}(f(\cdot, z)-f(\infty, z)) \in H_{\lambda}^{\nu_{1}}(\bar{D})$, if the domain is unbounded. The determinant of the symbol matrix $\Phi(A)(x, \xi)$ of the integral operator (34) is different from zero and either of the following two conditions is fulfilled:
(i) $\forall x \in M$ the matrix $\Phi(A)(x, \xi)$ is strongly elliptic and Hermitian; (ii) $\forall x \in M$ the matrix $\Phi(A)(x, \xi)$ is strongly elliptic and odd with respect to the variable $\xi$.

Then the operator $A$ is the Noether operator both in the space $\left[L_{p}(D,(1+\right.$ $\left.\left.|x|)^{\gamma}\right)\right]^{n}$ and in the space $\left[H_{\alpha, \beta}^{\nu}(D)\right]^{n}$. Any solution of the equation

\begin{equation*}
A(u)(x)=g(x), \quad g \in\left[L_{p}\left(D,(1+|x|)^{\gamma}\right)\right]^{n} \cap\left[H_{\alpha, \beta}^{\nu}(D)\right]^{n} \tag{35}
\end{equation*}
$$

from the space $\left[L_{p}\left(D,(1+|x|)^{\gamma}\right)\right]^{n}$ belongs to the space $\left[L_{p}\left(D,(1+|x|)^{\gamma}\right)\right]^{n} \cap$ $\left[H_{\alpha, \beta}^{\nu}(D)\right]^{n}$. For equation (35) to be solvable it is necessary and sufficient that $(g, v)=0$, where $v$ is an arbitrary solution of the formally conjugate equation $A^{\prime}(v)=0$ from the space $\left[L_{p^{\prime}}\left(D,(1+|x|)^{-\gamma}\right)\right]^{n}$ into $\left[H_{\alpha, \beta}^{\nu}(D)\right]^{n}$.

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
